I am pleased to report that the work has been completed on the current phase of the Society's "Archives Improvement" project. The Society's final report was submitted to the Ontario Trillium Foundation (OTF) in early March. As this note is being written, we are awaiting a response from the OTF. I wish to extend a sincere thank-you to the Ontario Trillium Foundation for their ongoing support over the lifetime of the project, and to all of those Society members who have contributed their time and talents.

With funding in the form of a \$29,400 grant from the OTF, we have purchased computer equipment and software, received archives training, engaged the services of a professional archives consultant, selected and installed specialized archiving software, and started the lengthy process of scanning material in the Society's collection and storing the digitized files on the Society's computer equipment. As we move our operations into the 21st century, we have also started making use of social media to raise the Society's profile and increase accessibility to the Society's collections. Junction Rediscovered - Marg Lyons

On March 12th, twenty-one of us gathered with Neil Ross to begin a ramble that helped uncover many stories having to do with the Junction. Neil is a writer, an actor, a historian and a raconteur extraordinaire! He introduced us to the area by describing the various men and women who first settled this part of Toronto. He spoke of how the word "Junction" meant to him not only the railways but also a place where people from many backgrounds found a safe home. The first mosque, the first synagogue, churches of many denominations - all included in this patch of land, all together. We heard from the fiery William Lyon Mackenzie who dared hope that the people in this new world could expect a democracy similar to that of Britain's; about the land wise Clendenans; the newspaper man, A.B. Rice; the first woman doctor, Minerva Reid. We took a good look at the buildings - the homes, work places, the theatres and houses of worship of these citizens. It was a very special afternoon... Together in the sunshine, listening to the past speak.

Rona Arato is an award winning author. She was born in New York, and grew up in Los Angeles. She earned a BA in teaching with credentials from UCLA and has taught in Los Angeles, Israel, and Toronto, where she moved to in 1970. Rona's articles have appeared in Canada, the US and England. She has taught creative writing, for the TDSB, and also worked as a public relations consultant, and did business-writing seminars. From 1994-98 she interviewed survivors for Stephen Spielberg's book "Survivors of the Shoah Visual History Foundation". She has written 17 children's books, including "Ten for Freedom, the story of Josiah Hensen." One of her books, "Ten Canadians who made a Difference": won the Ontario Library Association's Golden Oak Award in 2011. She continues to win awards worldwide, and in 2013, one of her books was designated one of the best books by the Canadian Children's Book Centre.

She will present her book on the Holocaust "The Last Train" in which two boys try to hide their mother's illness from their German captors in the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp, even as they struggle to survive the camp's appalling conditions.
